## FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Resonance is defined as the quality (in sound) of being deep, full, and reverberating. It is a fitting term to describe the Museum's work during the 2023 fiscal year. Through exhibitions, public programs, and educational outreach, this year's work was multifaceted, designed to appeal to many audiences, and intended to open or advance meaningful conversations and cultural considerations. Our work stewarding the Museum's rich and extensive collections and archives, caring for the historic synagogues, and building internal work culture and systems, while less publicly visible, carries deep reverberations of resonance as well. The resonance of our work is one that connects the past to the present and encourages us to imagine expansive Jewish life in the future.

Among the many profoundly resonant experiences I had at the Museum throughout the last year, I highlight a few:

Saved! was an original performance that used critical reflection, humor, and the lived experiences of Jewish people from the former Soviet Union to respond to historical narratives that were presented in Power of Protest: The Movement to Free Soviet Jews, an exhibition curated by the Weitzman National Museum of American Jewish History and presented by JMM from November 2022 through February 2023. The resonance in this program was found in JMM's ability to serve as a platform for many voices and perspectives

and to use the exhibition as a point of departure for exploration of the experiences of Jews from the former Soviet Union.

The way the presenters creatively responded to the exhibition with care and comedy resonated for all who experienced it and served as a model for the boundless possibilities of a participatory practice that uplifts visitor feedback.

Immersive Sound: Music from the Mikvah was a culminating public program conceptualized by JMM's Campus Connectors, a project funded by the Jacob and Hilda Blaustein Fund for the Enrichment of Jewish Education.

The Campus Connectors were charged with »

working with the Museum's public programs team to extend the Museum's outreach efforts through co-promotion of Museum events and collaborative program design. Immersive Sound invited local musicians to record music in the mikvah ritual bath space of the historic Lloyd Street Synagogue. The recordings were presented in a public program that invited the musicians, their friends, and fans, and JMM members to experience these original performances while learning about the mikvah. This program resonated sonically through the powerful acoustics of the mikvah complex and communally as it brought many people to the Museum campus to receive this art and learn about Jewish rituals related to the mikvah.

While the innovations of the Museum's programs and exhibitions evolved throughout the year, the building temporarily closed shortly before the end of the 2023 fiscal year to initiate the first phase of a capital project. Our staff continues its work developing exhibitions, caring for its collections and facilities and hosting community events while evolving our internal systems, practices,

and culture throughout the building closure. We will be prepared to pick up where we left off when the building reopens in fiscal year 2025, a time on the horizon when our modernized front of house will be buzzing with the resonance and promise of the next chapter of the Jewish Museum of Maryland.

## **INCOMING PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE**

Over the years, I have had many relationships with JMM—as a student researcher, amateur genealogist, education intern, volunteer docent, and board member. In preparation for my current role as president, I served as the executive vice president during FY23. Seeing JMM's inner workings from this perspective made me even more excited to serve in this position. Connecting regularly with staff members deepened my appreciation for their work and talents. Strengthening relationships with board members and meeting volunteers reinforced the dedication towards JMM. Meeting collaborators and visitors reminded me of why we do this work.

In my speech at the May 2023 Annual Meeting, I asked attendees to respond to two prompts on either side of a notecard. On the front of the card, "What connects you to JMM now?" On the back, "What promise do you see of JMM's future?"

On the front of the card, attendees provided more concrete answers: the historic synagogues, neighborhood, exhibits, events, and specific staff and board members. However, on the back, attendees described lofty concepts using keywords such as "inclusive," "community," "engaging all ages," and "diversity." How will we use this year to bridge the discrete elements of the past with visionary hopes for the future? "

"The Year of Renewal" is how I refer to FY24 because the JMM will focus on transforming in three ways:

- 1. Remodeling the visitor-facing interior, including our in-person and digital brand identity;
- 2. Updating internal processes, systems, and work culture;
- 3. Preparing for the development of new exhibits.

While the physical building is closed to the public, JMM is very much open for business—through remote visitor offerings, including numerous exhibit websites, virtual tours, monthly zines, and the *Disloyal* podcast—all while staff members manage the capital project, brand renewal, internal workings upgrades, exhibit development, and related fundraising.

Following this "Year of Renewal," we will have the facility, digital presence, and back-end support to create content, programming, and exhibits that engage all ages across the affiliation spectrum, including those outside the Jewish community, while serving as an asset for our neighbors in Jonestown and Jewish Baltimore City residents.

I am grateful to have studied under Nancy Kutler's tutelage for FY23 and am thrilled (and feel ready!) to serve as president in FY24 with the support of JMM board and staff. Please join me in celebrating JMM's accomplishments to date and cheering JMM on during its next phase—connecting the two sides of the notecard to become one seamless story.

## **OUTGOING PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE**

I am pleased to be writing this letter at the conclusion of my three-year term. I can say in no uncertain terms that it has been both a pleasure and a privilege to serve as President of JMM.

When I agreed to step into this leadership position, I felt the Museum was on solid footing with stable leadership. Two big challenges quickly undermined that sense of a steady ship.

First, In 2019 Marvin Pinkert announced his retirement as Executive Director. We formed a Search Committee in January 2020 to hire his successor. All was moving forward smoothly until COVID hit in March of that year. To say that the pandemic created an overwhelming challenge is an understatement.

What happened next is one of the things that makes me proud of my involvement with JMM. In the face of COVID, JMM did not throw up its hands but rather rolled up its sleeves and made an amazing pivot. We continued our Search Committee process over Zoom and managed to hire Sol Davis virtually,

without him having ever been to Baltimore or setting foot in the Museum.

With Sol at the helm, we reimagined the manner in which we did things in dramatic and long-lasting ways. We developed a highly skilled and creative professional staff, we excelled at the turn to digital, we executed participatory and socially engaged museum practices, we built relationships with the general and Jewish communities in Baltimore and beyond, and we expanded the demographics of people who engage with us.

We have mounted some of the most creative and provocative art exhibits with A Fence Around the Torah: Safety and Unsafety in Jewish Life, Material/Inheritance:

Contemporary Work by New Jewish Culture Fellows, and My Odessa: Paintings by Yefim Ladyzhensky, and explored historical human rights issues through Power of Protest:

The Movement to Free Soviet Jews, and Blacklist: The Hollywood Red Scare. This is only a sampling of what we have accomplished, and it makes me feel very proud. »

Before I close, I need to convey some important thank you's:

• To to the Board of Directors and the chairs of our committees. I feel blessed to be surrounded by people who gave so generously of their time, talent, and resources.

• To the very talented staff for the devotion they bring day in and day out to advance our mission. We all know that the professional staff is the engine that keeps JMM running;

• To The Associated for its unwavering support, both human and financial;

• To our partners in the Jonestown community and beyond;

• To our members, supporters, and visitors. We could not do what we do without you.

## Blacklist: The Hollywood Red Scare

Blacklist: The Hollywood Red Scare is an original exhibition created by and on loan from Jewish Museum Milwaukee. It brings the history of the Cold War to life through personal narratives of blacklisted people, members of the House Un-American Activities Committee, and film executives, telling the stories of people on both sides of the Communist/anti-Communist divide. The exhibition features film stills, photographs, movie posters, documents, and clips from movies, and it explores the intersection of politics, popular culture, economics, and the First Amendment.

## My Odessa: Paintings by Yefim Ladyzhensky

Yefim Ladyzhensky (1911-1982) was a Jewish Odessan painter, writer, and stage designer. This exhibition, curated by JMM Curator-in-Residence Liora Ostroff, featured 36 tempera paintings alongside excerpts from Ladyzhensky's unpublished memoirs. In his paintings and writings, Ladyzhensky reflected on his life in early 20th-century Odessa, presenting a dynamic city rich with humor, arts, and Jewish life. Many of the figures recall Ladyzhensky's youth: tradespeople and shop clerks, family, and neighbors, all composed within flattened perspectives and densely textured surfaces.





# Power of Protest: The Movement to Free Soviet Jews

Created by the Weitzman National Museum of American Jewish History in Philadelphia, Power of Protest: The Movement to Free Soviet Jews covers the movement in the US to support Soviet Jews. Inspired by the civil rights, antiwar, and feminist movements of the 1960s and 1970s, students, community leaders, and tens of thousands of people mobilized to support Soviet Jews attempting to leave the Soviet Union.

# Material/Inheritance: Contemporary Work by New Jewish Culture Fellows

Material/Inheritance: Contemporary Work by New Jewish Culture Fellows is an original JMM exhibition featuring 30 artists whose work has been supported by the New Jewish Culture Fellowship (NJCF), a national arts fellowship that advances the work of groundbreaking artists by offering material support, mentorship, peer feedback, and shared cultural investigation. The exhibition features new media, live performances, painting, music, video, poetry, food, sculpture, and more, and addresses subject matter like queer and trans identities, embodiment and sexuality, archival modalities, activist movements, political histories, and radical possibilities for regenerative and inventive survival. Material/Inheritance was curated by JMM Curator-in-Residence Leora Fridman, a writer, educator, and NJCF alum.





"I was moved to actual tears when I looked out at the crowd during the opening events of *Material/Inheritance*: elders, folks of my parent's generation, millennials like me, people with young kids, gen z art school kids. Everyone came together to experience world-class performances and visual art that was unapologetically Jewish. ## LOMBARD AND LLOYD LIBRARY

In March 2023, we planted the Lombard & Lloyd Library on the grassy corner of JMM's campus at the intersection of Lombard and Lloyd Streets. Inspired by the Little Free Library book-sharing boxes that have popped up throughout the country, the Lombard & Lloyd Library is a dynamic public space that allows Museum guests, community members, and neighbors to share books, zines, and resources like KN95 masks and other public health supplies. The Lombard & Lloyd Library operates as a take-what-you-need, give-what-you-can system, and is decorated with shapes, symbols, and colors commonly used in Jewish art and culture.

## **Purim Carnival Crew**

This year, JMM collaborated with Hinenu Baltimore to put on a Purim carnival by and for youth. In preparation for the carnival, JMM Community Artist-in-Residence Naomi Rose Weintraub led a 10-week workshop series for youth ages 10-16.

Throughout the workshop series, participants, known as the Purim Carnival Crew, were provided immersive Jewish education and a project-based curriculum inspired by Jewish culture and social justice. This program focused on accessibility, inclusivity, and creating a diverse learning environment.

The Purim Carnival Crew collaborated to plan the carnival and created puppets, games, and decorations. Guest teachers and artists from MICA and Black Cherry Puppet Theater came to help the participants learn about puppetry, script writing, and sculpture.

The culminating Purim Carnival featured a puppet performance, art activities, games, and a costume parade.

## **EDUCATION DEPARTMENT**

In the past year, the JMM Education Department has continued to deepen our work with local educators, curriculum specialists, and students.

Our 2022 Summer Teachers Institute, Foundations of Teaching the Holocaust, centered on the essentials of Holocaust education. Our 2023 Winter Teachers Institute, Teaching *The U.S. and the Holocaust* Documentary, investigated the knowledge, fears, and responses of the American government while also exploring the actions and inactions of individuals during the Holocaust.

The education team has also continued to deliver our digital Holocaust Memory Project program to Maryland schools, including 400 students comprising the entire 8th-grade class at Crofton Middle School. We launched a new Holocaust Memory Project website where teachers and students can access 91 collages and captions created by members of our local survivor community and their families. We also hosted a training for educators to familiarize them with the Holocaust Memory Project, the new website, and forthcoming lesson plans.

Our team participated in three countywide Professional Learning Days, providing a module for teachers on pedagogies of teaching traumatic histories. We also met with 11 district-level public school curriculum supervisors from different counties in Maryland to discuss our work and how JMM can best support their educators.

Finally, we held an off-site field trip for St. Paul's School for Boys, engaging them in a specialized Holocaust Memory Project program before a group of their senior students left for a trip to Europe, where they visited several historical Holocaust sites.

The Six and Eight Numbers Syndicate was one of the oldest numbers operations in Baltimore. Headed by three brothers, George Goldberg (1903-1987), Irvin Goldberg (1907-1958), and Sam "Mookie" Goldberg (1909-1984), the illegal gambling syndicate was prominent in the 1930s. This L.C. Smith & Corona adding machine was owned and used by George Goldberg, the leading figure of the alliance.








